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Scripture Texts: Joshua 24:1-3, 14-25

Then Joshua assembled all the tribes of Israel at Shechem. He summoned the elders, leaders, judges and officials of Israel, and they presented themselves before God.

- ² Joshua said to all the people, "This is what the Lord, the God of Israel, says: 'Long ago your ancestors, including Terah the father of Abraham and Nahor, lived beyond the Euphrates River and worshiped other gods. ³ But I took your father Abraham from the land beyond the Euphrates and led him throughout Canaan and gave him many descendants.
- ¹⁴ "Now fear the Lord and serve him with all faithfulness. Throw away the gods your ancestors worshiped beyond the Euphrates River and in Egypt, and serve the Lord. ¹⁵ But if serving the Lord seems undesirable to you, then choose for yourselves this day whom you will serve, whether the gods your ancestors served beyond the Euphrates, or the gods of the Amorites, in whose land you are living. But as for me and my household, we will serve the Lord."
- ¹⁶ Then the people answered, "Far be it from us to forsake the Lord to serve other gods! ¹⁷ It was the Lord our God himself who brought us and our parents up out of Egypt, from that land of slavery, and performed those great signs before our eyes. He protected us on our entire journey and among all the nations through which we traveled. ¹⁸ And the Lord drove out before us all the nations, including the Amorites, who lived in the land. We too will serve the Lord, because he is our God."
- ¹⁹ Joshua said to the people, "You are not able to serve the Lord. He is a holy God; he is a jealous God. He will not forgive your rebellion and your sins. ²⁰ If you forsake the Lord and serve foreign gods, he will turn and bring disaster on you and make an end of you, after he has been good to you."
- ²¹ But the people said to Joshua, "No! We will serve the Lord."
- ²² Then Joshua said, "You are witnesses against yourselves that you have chosen to serve the Lord."

1 Thessalonians 4:13-18

¹³ Brothers and sisters, we do not want you to be uninformed about those who sleep in death, so that you do not grieve like the rest of humankind, who have no hope. ¹⁴ For we believe that Jesus died and rose again, and so we believe that God will bring with Jesus those who have fallen asleep in him. ¹⁵ According to the Lord's word, we tell you that we who are still alive, who are left until the coming of the Lord, will certainly not precede those who have fallen asleep. ¹⁶ For the Lord himself will come down from heaven, with a loud command, with the voice of the archangel and with the trumpet call of God, and the dead in Christ will rise first. ¹⁷ After that, we who are still alive and are left will be caught up together with them in the clouds to meet the Lord in the air. And so we will be with the Lord forever. ¹⁸ Therefore encourage one another with these words.

Meditation

In the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit. Amen.

At this time of the year, we remember, we give thanks, and we honour those who have served and given their lives in so many armed conflicts throughout history. Our Canadian military strives to bring and keep peace in areas of strife. They serve to protect our freedom, secure the freedom of others, and provide aid and relief where there is disaster and devastation. Too many have died in their efforts to bring an end to conflict, or to protect the innocents whose lives are destroyed by war. Our hearts are heavy as we acknowledge Remembrance Day, for we know how deep the sacrifice and heartbreak has been for so many families. We cannot know their grief unless we have experienced this type of loss. We cannot stand in their shoes. But we can stand together to honour the fallen, to express our gratitude to those who have retired from active military service, and support those who continue to serve. Young adults from our own congregation are currently serving in the Army and Navy. People have children and grandchildren, nieces and nephews in active service, or retired. We have neighbours and friends that serve or have served in the military. We give thanks to God for the Canadian Forces, and ask the Lord to protect them, no matter where they are currently stationed.

From one generation to the next, we are thankful for those who fought for and protect our freedom. As we read the passage from Joshua today, we are reminded of the importance of remembering those who have gone before us, who have known God's blessings, and have passed them to us.

Those who have gone before us have shaped who we are today. Our ancestors in life and faith have passed the worship and service of the church from one generation to the next. Just as it is important, to learn from their wisdom, we also learn from their missteps.

God promised Abraham as many descendants as there are stars in the sky. Generation after generation lived in that promise, until the time of Jesus when the law was fulfilled, and the generations began passing on faith in what God has done to save and protect us through Christ. From the beginning, God has been faithful to his people without wavering.

From the beginning, <u>God's people</u> have made mistakes. Generation after generation has tried to take matters into their own hands when they were tired of waiting for God to act, and generation after generation has known the consequences. Generation after generation has needed God's forgiveness. In today's reading, Joshua reminds Israel of the mistakes their ancestors made in worshipping pagan deities, and warns the people to break the habit. He tells them to make their choice between the One True God and other false gods, "But as for me and my household, we will serve the Lord," he says. The people declare their intention to also serve the Lord God, and Joshua gives them a stern warning about what will happen if they again turn from Yahweh. They must serve the One True God and him alone. The people insist they will follow and obey. So Joshua renewed the law and the covenant between God and his people, and the generations continued. It didn't always go well. Mistakes happened. So did redemption.

In Thessalonians we see the apostle assuring his readers that those who have died before the coming of God's kingdom will indeed be raised to new life for they died with hope that the day of the Lord would come and Christ's reign would finally be established on earth. Those who die having faith in Christ, as the Gospel assures us without any doubt, shall not perish but have eternal life (John 3:16). Those ancestors that have lived the faith and passed it on from one generation to the next are among those who will know eternal life because they not only believed the cross and resurrection to be true, but they made sure others believe it too. The church lives today because the Holy Spirit has breathed life into it, and because those before us have passed it along to us.

On Remembrance Day, we are heartbreakingly aware of those who have died sacrificially for the sake of others. Those who died having hope in the life promised through Christ will know the fulfillment of that promise. We are grateful to them for what they have done for Canada and the world, and for what they gave to make sure those that came after them would benefit. Those who serve now have had the honour passed to them from those who went before them, and they will continue to translate that honour to those who will come next.

From generation to generation the world has known war and peace, conflict and resolution. It always has, and always will. Thank goodness each generation has also had the opportunity to experience and endure these things with hope in Christ's final freedom. May we always remember the hope we hold onto because the faith has come to us from the generations before us, the hope we must share with the next.
